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The Law Of Eminent Domain

Eminent domain refers to the power of the government to take private property and convert it into public use. The Fifth Amendment provides that the government may only exercise this power if they provide just compensation to the property owners.

State Laws on Eminent Domain. Eminent domain refers to the power of the state to appropriate property within the state for a public use. States passed eminent domain legislation in response to the US Supreme Court decision in Kelo v. City of New London, 545 U.S. 469 (2005). The case decided the question of the use of eminent domain to transfer land from one private owner to another to further economic development.

The federal government's power of eminent domain has long been used in the United States to acquire property for public use. Eminent domain "appertains to every independent government. It requires no constitutional recognition; it is an attribute of sovereignty." Boom Co. v. Patterson, 98 U.S. 403, 406 (1879).
